At Thursday's Television Critics Association meetings in Beverly Hills, CBS chatted up some things old and new. From political drama Madam Secretary to Two and a Half Men. USA TODAY's Robert Bianco, Bill Keveney and Gary Levin report.



Scott Bakula are joining forces to push a third franchise in the lawenforcement drama, NCIS: New Orleans, into the spotlight.

Bakula plays the head of the New Orleans office for the agency, which investigates crimes involving military personnel. Harmon is an executive producer.

New Orleans will have the benefit of following NCIS, TV's mostwatched show scripted series last season, and also the experience of Harmon and Gary Glasberg, an executive producer of both series.

Bakula recognizes the original's success. "The hope is, where we're going and with the characters that are being developed for us, that we can get an audience to invest with us." - Keveney
